### MISSOURI BEHAVIORAL RISK ASSESSMENT TRAINING: THE MISSOURI MODEL

The Merriam Webster dictionary defines assessment as: the act of making a judgment about something; an idea or opinion about something

The Missouri Model is a process of gathering and reviewing information to develop an understanding of a situation upon which to base decisions regarding intervention




### **Missouri Model**

- CES and MSBA recommend behavioral risk assessment teams for schools
- Local school board adopts policies and procedures for team establishment and/or incorporates into the crisis plan
- The superintendent of the district creates a multidisciplinary team (for district or each building)



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

### What is Behavioral Risk Assessment? A systematic process that is designed to:





#### Is the subject on a path to violence?

- A team approach is most effective for gathering and evaluating risk and situational information, and providing necessary interventions including community referrals.
- The process of risk assessment and case management is to mitigate or eliminate the risk level with a team approach.
- Engagement with a subject or person of concern can be critical to preventing harm or a violent act.



### **Goal of Behavioral Risk Assessment**

Safety of all involved – subject(s), school, community

- Counseling
- Confrontation

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### Safe School Initiative

#### Background:

- Largest federal study of school shootings in the US.
- Collaboration between US Secret Service and US Department of Education.
- 37 incidents, 41 attackers
- Focus was on operational information what could be detectable and usable

### **Major Facts about School Shootings**

# 1. School-based attacks are rarely sudden, impulsive acts.

#### Major Facts about School Shootings (Cont.)

- 2. Prior to the attacks, others usually knew of attacker's idea/plan.
- 3. Most attackers did not threaten their targets directly prior to the attack.
- 4. There is no accurate or useful profile of the "school shooter".

#### Major Facts about School Shootings (Cont.)

- 5. Most attackers had seriously concerned others in their lives prior to the attack.
- Most attackers had significant difficulties with losses or failures. Most were suicidal.
- 7. Many felt bullied, persecuted, or injured by others prior to the attack.

## Major Facts about School Shootings

- 8. Most attackers had access to weapons and have used weapons -- prior to the attack.
- 9. In many cases, other students were involved in some capacity.
- 10. Despite prompt law enforcement response, most incidents were stopped by means other than law enforcement intervention.

\*\*Most were very brief in duration

### **Responding to Risks**

- Successful management of a risk situation can require substantial time and effort.
- Management of these situations comprise three related functions:
  - Controlling / containing the situation and/or subject in a way that will prevent the possibility of an attack;
  - Protecting and aiding possible targets to the extent possible; and,
  - Providing support and guidance to help the subject deal successfully with his or her problems.



### **MSBA Legal Guidance**

Are notes collected for behavioral risk team protected or can they be subpoenaed?

- If the leader is the school counselor do these notes come under the same regulations as counseling notes?
  - Arguably, no.
- Regardless of who is team leader?
  - Always assume these notes could be subpoenaed

\*Always discuss with district legal counsel\*

### **Encourage Reporting**

- Bystanders can play a critical role in prevention
- Role of risk assessment team is not punitive
- Goals are to maintain safety and connect person with necessary help
- Earlier reporting allows greater range of options
- Reporting allows something to be done






